They are the faithful remnant of believers who have been prepared for the end times and will stand as witnesses for God's justice and judgment.

This righteousness is not earned but received as a gift, signifying their new identity and standing before God. The Israel in Revelation Chapter 14 will face God's judgment at the second coming, not at the rapture.
